Sociology includes the study of individuals, groups, and society. Sociology courses emphasize the understanding of social issues and analysis of interactions of both small-scale interactions and large-scale institutions. The effects of gender, social class, religion and other aspects of culture and society are considered. Students in the Sociology program at Wayne State College learn to appreciate socio-cultural diversity within and among societies, and to be sensitive to people from various ethnic, religious, racial, and economic backgrounds. This enables graduates of the program to function in an increasingly diverse society once they leave the college campus.

Through original research, students in Sociology learn to think critically about society and social issues. They are able to collect, analyze and present information from their field.
