In order to complete a B.A./B.S. degree, students must select a second subject area from either the middle level core academic subjects or from other middle level subject areas. Note: Students can also choose any other subject or field endorsement offered by the college. Total number of hours will depend on your selections.

Additional middle level subject areas include family and consumer sciences occupational, health and physical education, or special education. See catalog for list of acceptable classes in each area.
