## Field endorsement to teach grades K-12

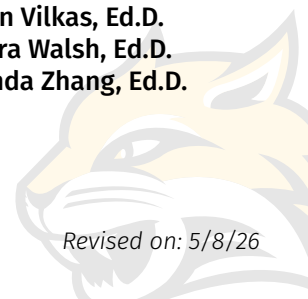
