Subject endorsement to teach grades 6-12

Not all students learn in the same way, and there is a high demand for qualified special education teachers who can provide personalized instruction and support to students with disabilities, or students who may face unique challenges. In the Special Education degree program at Wayne State, you'll learn how to provide individualized instruction tailored to the unique needs of students with exceptionalities. You'll also learn about special education law and develop the advocacy skills needed to ensure your students receive the resources, support, and accommodations they need. The Special Education degree program at WSC will help you develop the collaboration strategies you'll need to work with professional service providers, agencies, and parents.

The Special Education Generalist (6-12) subject endorsement is not a standalone program. You must also select a second subject endorsement or field endorsement to receive your B.A. or B.S.
