Master of Science in Education (MSE)

School counselors combine a passion for helping others with the ability to support students in an educational setting. Wayne State College's master's degree in School Counseling is designed to prepare you for PK-12 school counseling roles and supports the coursework and supervised experiences needed to pursue school counseling endorsement in Nebraska. If you plan to work in another state, we recommend reviewing that state's endorsement and licensure requirements.

This program emphasizes advanced counseling skills, ethical decision-making, and cultural competence, while preparing students to meet the evolving needs of today's schools. Coursework integrates the American School Counselor Association (ASCA) model, student-centered interventions, referral and assessment practices, and strategies for prevention, crisis response, and coordinated student support services.

Through supervised practicum and PK-12 internship experiences in both elementary and secondary settings, students gain real-world preparation and professional mentorship. Graduates leave ready to support student academic success, social-emotional development, and college and career readiness.

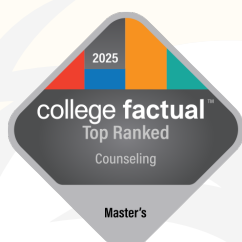
