Coursework emphasizes applying research-based instructional techniques and curriculum development principles to PK-12 or postsecondary FCS settings, culminating in original research tailored to your area of focus. This program is intended for educators who already hold certification in family and consumer sciences. It does not lead to initial teacher licensure, and licensure applicability may vary by state.
